


Music Literally!

April Musical Minute

This month let's learn about musical pitches! Pitches are created when something vibrates. When you hum or sing, you are creating pitches! Try humming or singing your favorite song to experience creating pitches. We give pitches letter names by using the first portion of our alphabet: A B C D E F G.


Composers (people who write music) use pitches to write melodies, harmonies, and more. To write down the pitches, musicians use a chart of sorts, called the staff, to organize the pitches. You can see the staff has 5 lines, we count from the bottom up. Each line represents one pitch.







To remember the order from bottom to top, I like to think of the sentence "Every Good Burger Deserves Fries." We call these "line notes" because they are located directly on lines 1-5. See how the lines go right through them?

In between those lines are open spaces. There are 4 open spaces. Again, we count from the bottom up.



The notes that live in the spaces are called "space note" and they spell a word you may recognize! See how these notes are located *between* the lines?





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If you are trying to identify a note on the staff, start by deciding if it is a line or space note. Let's practice. This note is on a line, see how the line goes right through it? Counting up from the bottom it is on line 1, 2, 3! What is the letter name for line 3 in the staff? B! This note is a B.

Let's try another one.









Challenge Round!

What have you learned about yourself during the pandemic?


I've learned during the pandemic that there were ALOT of wars happened and that taxes exist back then.

What is the first thing you want to do when the pandemic is over?


I don't know what to do when the pandemic is over- maybe I'll just go somewhere.

We (my small group peers and I) will be researching details about Paris, France's animals. There are many animals that are different in France. For instance, France has a roe deer, which is from the USA red deer.


Now, we are not only doing animals. We will also be researching plants in Paris, France.
