



How to read...MUSIC!!


Did you know musicians learn how to read and write music the way Pulaski scholars learn how to read and write words? We use a collection of symbols to write down our music and read the music of others!

By the end of this post you will: write your name in musical notation!

First, think of something very steady like a clock ticking or a heartbeat. Can you clap your hands to a steady beat and count to four?




Great job! Now, keep the pattern going and keep your pulse *steady* like the clock or heart! It is not a race to the end.




How did you do? See how many times you can count to four with a steady pulse.

Sometimes we want our music to go faster than those big beats, so we connect the hearts with a line to show we want to hear two sounds. Say this word out loud with your steady pulse: APPLE. How many syllables? Two! Two sounds! Try clapping while you speak:



Great job! Remember that steady pulse. We know a single heart is ONE sound (or syllable) and the connected hearts are TWO sounds (or syllables). Let's use the musical symbols to write your name.

Example: Doctor K ($\underline{\text{doc}}$ - $\underline{\text{tor}}$ + $\underline{\text{kay}}$ = 3 syllables) My name has 3 syllables, so I need a pair of connected hearts plus a single heart.



Step 1: Find out how many syllables are in your first name. Write down that number.

Step 2: Break down your number into an addition statement using only 1s and 2s. If you have....

5 syllables: 1 + 1 + 2 + 1 = 5 **OR** 2 + 2 + 1 = 5

4 syllables: 1 + 1 + 1 + 1 = 4 **OR** 2 + 2 = 4


3 syllables: 1 + 1 + 1 = 3 **OR** 2 + 1 = 3

2 syllables: 1 + 1 = 2 **OR** 2 = 2

1 syllable: 1 = 1

Step 3: Replace your number with the correct musical symbol. If you have...

2 + 2 + 1 = 5 (Principal Smith-Dean)



Candace: I found that you should never chop down trees. They are important and the animals, insects, and bugs need trees—and we do too—for oxygen






PRINCIPAL PERSPECTIVE
